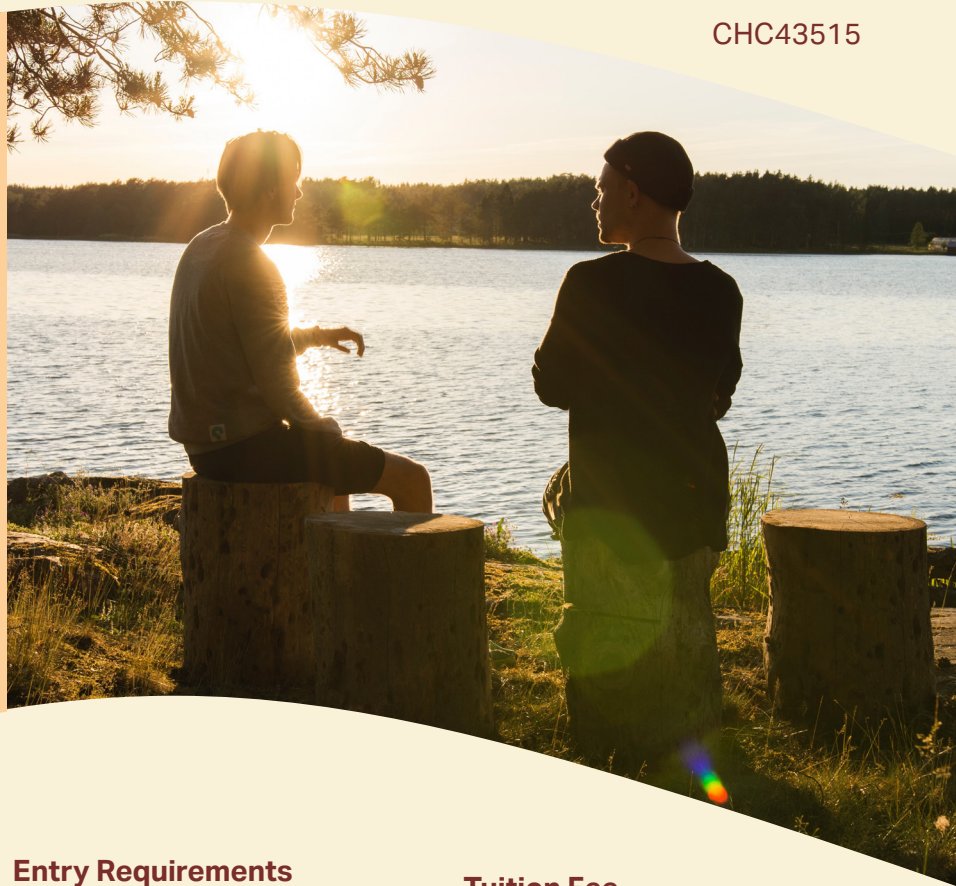


Certificate IV in Mental Health Peer Work

For people who have lived experience of mental illness as either a consumer or carer and who work in mental health services.



Overview

This qualification reflects the role of workers who have lived experience of mental illness as either a consumer or carer and who work in mental health services that support consumer peers or carer peers. Workers are employed in the mental health sector in government, public, private or community managed services.

A Lived Experience (Peer) Worker is "a person who is employed in a role that requires them to identify as being, or having been a mental health consumer or carer. Peer work requires that Lived Experience of mental illness is an essential criterion of job descriptions, although job titles and related tasks vary."

Entry Requirements

Learners in this program must have a lived experience of mental health either as direct personal experience or as a carer of someone with mental health lived experience.

Study Requirements

This program has 22 face to face classroom contact days and 16 Online tutorials. This program is equivalent to 15 to 20 hours of study per week. This program includes 80 hour work based practicum.

Students will be required to undertake self-directed learning outside of classroom delivery.

Prior Recognition of Learning

You may be eligible for recognition of prior learning (RPL) for this qualification. Please see our website for more details.

Practicum Requirements

To achieve this qualification, students must have completed 80 hours of practicum in a simulated work environment as detailed in the Assessment Requirements of units of competency. This component will be undertaken within Relationships Australia South Australia.

Duration & Delivery Mode

12 months. Blended learning – Online and compulsory classroom sessions.

Tuition Fee

Full fee: \$6,000

Participants eligible for SA Government subsidies: \$1,200 (Tuition Gap Fee)

Participants eligible for SA Government subsidies with valid concession card: \$500.00 (Tuition Gap Fee)

Employment Opportunities

Peer work, peer workers and peer workforce include all workers in mainstream or alternative mental health services or initiatives who are employed to openly identify and use their lived experience of mental distress or as a carer supporting someone with mental illness as part of their work. Roles and positions could include:

- Consumer peer worker
- Carer peer worker
- Peer support
- Peer advocate
- Peer educator
- Peer consultant
